Dear Members,

Please take the time to read the article below. Allied Charities of Minnesota is a non-profit trade association representing charities that hold a charitable gambling license. Their membership is comprised of veteran, fraternal, fire, church, youth, civic and foundation groups that serve communities. AlLund, the author, is the Executive Director of Allied Charities. He has been able to put into words the sentiment of his membership concerning the tax regulations that constrict the gaming industry in Minnesota. I think once you read the article you will have a better knowledge of charitable gambling and why we have to say no to some of the requests from our veterans and community. Personally I do not know of any other person or entity that has to pay taxes on charitable contributions in our country.

But we do! If you agree with us that charitable contributions should not be taxed please take the time to contact local State Senators and Representatives. Our goal is to maximize contributions to our veterans and community.

Charitable gaming bears more than its fair tax share; time for change.

Charitable gaming — the pulltabs and electronic games that were created to fund investments in community assets from ambulances to athletic fields — is enjoying boom times. Minnesotans are playing more, increasing revenue for the charities that operate the games by more than 13 percent in the last fiscal year (“Charitable gambling in Minnesota tops \$1.5 billion in 2016,” Jan. 6).

Yet, scratch the surface of the data and this reality becomes clear: The charities that operate the games with the intention of investing in their communities see nearly as much of their revenue go to finance the operations of state government as goes to local purposes. Instead of supporting community vitality, charitable gaming is becoming more and more of a hidden state tax.

Minnesotans expect to pay taxes, and charities that operate gaming for the sake of community investments are willing to pay their fair share. In recent years, though, their share has gone from fair to indefensible. The local veterans/fraternal/civic/youth/fire or police relief groups or any other organizations that conduct charitable gaming now pay a tax rate up to seven times higher than a for-profit business.

What is most harmful to the mission of these organizations is that they are taxed on every dollar, including their donations. The community-based groups pay up to 36 cents to the state for every dollar they are able to invest in making their towns and cities better and safer places to live. An organization raising funds to purchase an ambulance likely has to raise more than \$108,000 — \$80,000 for the cost of the ambulance itself and more than \$28,000 to pay state taxes on the donation.

The irony is that all this is happening at a time when the vitality of rural communities has moved to the political spotlight. While charitable gaming is an important source of community investment funds for suburbs and other larger communities, it is especially critical to rural areas.

Many rural communities are at their tax capacity paying for essential services. It is charitable gaming that often provides the funds for a new emergency vehicle, a restored youth athletic facility, a park shelter or some other amenity that makes the community a more attractive and safer place to live.

The revenue generated by charitable gaming can sometimes blind policymakers and others to the facts. The amount Minnesotans spent on pulltabs, bingo and electronic games in the last fiscal year is substantial — about \$1.5 billion. But nearly \$1.3 billion of that was paid out in prizes, with virtually the entire amount remaining in Minnesota communities. The charities are remarkably efficient operations, spending less than 7 percent on average for overhead, including the cost of running and promoting the games.

After all the expenses are tallied, charities pay on average about 44 percent of the balance — the amount that would be considered “profit” in the business world — in taxes. The rest, \$70 million, is left for the charitable mission.

Having \$70 million to invest in the vitality of communities around the state is no small amount. The organizations operating the games do a remarkable job of holding down costs (often relying on volunteers who give hours of free labor). Charitable gaming is run by and for Minnesotans. Organizations recognize that the state taxes they pay are returned through schools, roads, environmental protection and other programs that Minnesotans value.

Yet, when charities are treated as a cash cow and a largely hidden tax source, it is reasonable to ask for fairness. Charities this year are asking the Legislature to use a small portion of the state's \$1.4 billion surplus to eliminate state taxes on the donations charities make on behalf of their communities. That is, when charities invest in their communities through qualified contributions, the entire amount of the donation could be dedicated to the charitable purpose.

Charitable gaming still would have a tax rate of more than 26 percent on gross revenue. To put that in context, many policymakers argue that the state's corporate tax rate is unfair and uncompetitive. The nominal corporate rate in Minnesota is 98 percent.

Charitable gaming in Minnesota isn't a \$1.5 billion behemoth; it is thousands of small, low-cost and mostly volunteer organizations dedicated to making their communities better. Eliminating state taxes on their charitable missions — their donations to worthwhile causes — reflects the best of Minnesota: residents coming together to make their communities better places in which to live, work and play.

10TH ANNIVERSARY HONOR FLIGHT ANNOUNCED



Fargo - The WDAY Honor Flight Committee has announced the date for the next Honor Flight trip. The flight is scheduled to take off from Fargo's Hector International Airport on May 14th and return May 15th. The flight marks the 10th anniversary of the first Honor Flight taken out of Fargo.

Approximately 90-100 area WWII and Korean War veterans will fly on the chartered plane and visit the sites of Washington D. C., including the WWII and Korean War Memorials. They will also enjoy a banquet in their honor. The entire trip is completely free of charge to the veterans and a way for the community to say "thank you."

The veterans are chosen for the flight from the existing wait list with priority given to date of application as well as dates of service. Those veterans will be receiving letters from the committee inviting them to participate on this flight. The letters will be sent in the next couple of days. Veterans not selected will remain on the waiting list for a possible future flight.

The first WDAY Honor Flight (then known as the WDAY WWII Honor Flight) flew out of Fargo May 3-5, 2007 carrying 103 WWII veterans. Since that time, the WDAY Honor Flight has flown from Fargo to Washington, D.C. seven times carrying both WWII and Korean War veterans with the most recent trip taken in October 2016.

Fundraising efforts continue to help finance this trip as well as future trips. It costs about \$150,000 for one Honor Flight trip. For more information about upcoming fundraisers or how to donate go to: wdayhonorflight.areavoices.com.

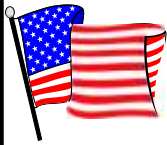
